Rob Ericsson



Robert (Rob) Ericsson was born in Mt. Shasta, California to Gary and Nicole Ericsson. He grew up in Weed, CA and attended elementary and high school there as well as a short stint at the College of the Siskiyous.

At 8 years old Rob started his baseball journey with little league on the Weed Yankees. He played four years with the Yankees and made the All Star Team at twelve and went to the regional tournament representing Weed.

Rob spent the following three years playing Babe Ruth for the Weed Dodgers which was coached by his dad Gary Ericsson. He mostly played second base, but when he was 15, he got his first start on the mound and threw a complete 3 hit game against the Cardinals also from Weed and got the win. Rob also filled in at catcher twice when needed. He made the All Star team each year and represented the South Siskiyou region mostly playing second base.

At Weed High School, Rob played all sports but was limited to only 1 year of baseball his senior year due to his school only having a varsity team. However, his love was football in high school where his teams won the league championships and missed the state championship by 1 game his junior year. In Rob's senior year he was distinguished with All League honors for his play as a Nose Guard and Linebacker. Rob also ran track and played basketball for 3 years and was a key member of the teams coming off the bench as the sixth man and spot starts. In his best game he had a double-double outing with 18 points and 16 rebounds. Rob was inducted into the Weed High School Hall of Fame for football in 2023.

After high school, Rob spent a year at the College of the Siskiyous before transferring to Yuba College where he played two years of baseball under Coach Gary Engelken. Rob was moved to third base his first year there and saw playing time off the bench and as a pinch hitter. The 49ers qualified for the JUCO World Series for CA but was eliminated in the first series. His sophomore year, Rob became a utility player and played multiple positions which also included outfield and first base. He led the team with four triples that season.

After college, Rob moved to Sacramento where he played in the city league and met his wife Robin. They married in May of 1994 and have two sons Tyler and Kyle. He took a long break from playing baseball but always had the passion and fire for the game. Rob coached his kids thru the years in baseball, basketball, and flag football.

In 2002, Rob came into the SMSBL playing a couple of games for the A's in the open division when they were short-handed thanks to the invite by Jason Smith. From there he became a full time player with Pilots and the adventure began. Rob played with multiple teams including the Brewers, Indians, River Cats, Sacramento Royals, Auburn Pirates, Free Agents, and The Bombers. He has been on multiple championship team's thru-out his career. He played on multiple teams in the World Series in both Florida and Arizona and has won two rings. The first ring was with the Sacramento Royals in Florida and the second was with the Blue Jays in Arizona. He also played with the Auburn Braves, Bombers, and Rockets in the Arizona World Series. Rob has had an unbelievable career with the SMSBL and has had the honor and privilege to play with some of the best players to come out of the Sacramento area.

Rob has been nominated multiple times by his peers for the John Daly Sportsmanship Award.

Mark Fowler

Mark was born in Placerville, California, the oldest of 4 boys. Mark and his brothers loved baseball from an early age, inspired by our grandfather who grew up in Boston as a young Red Sox fan. Mark's first experience playing organized baseball was as a catcher with the Orioles in the Timber Little League in Placerville.

Mark's family moved to Sacramento in 1968 and he continued to play ball as a Freshman at Encina High School, where he learned how much he didn't know about the game from his freshman coach Rich (Moose) Musillami. Moose went on to coach Rio Linda High to 14 conference championships during his 26 years as head varsity coach. Mark played all 4 years at Encina, the last two under Coach John Smith, who went on to have a storied career as the head coach at

Sacramento State.

During Mark's senior year, Coach Smith, a native of Siskiyou County, took the Encina team on a spring road trip to Weed, California to play a game vs. the College of the Siskiyous junior college team, and after graduating from Encina Mark played 2 years of JC ball in Weed under head coach Dennis DeRoss.

After graduating from UC Davis Mark's baseball career appeared to be over until he had a chance encounter with Brian Pearson, an old high school teammate. Brian was organizing a team for a new Stan Musial Adult league in the early 80's. Mark played Stan Musial ball for 3 years, then real life took over, marriage, a family and a lot of beer league softball games.

In 1993 Mark ran into Brian Pearson again at his son Craig's first T-Ball game. Brian was starting another Team in a new league called SMSBL. Mark played for several years with the Marlins, then in 2002 he joined former Marlins teammate Mike Baker on the Auburn Braves team. Mark has been with the Braves now for 23 years and has played on 20 Arizona MSBL World Series teams with the Braves, winning back to back championships in 2015 and 2016.

Mark has been married for 40 years to his wife Lauren, who he met while attending College of the Siskiyous. Mark and Lauren are the proud parents of son Craig, a firefighter with the City of San Francisco and a 5 year Veteran of the US Army's 2nd Ranger Battalion with 6 combat deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan during the Global War on Terror.

Mark feels extremely fortunate to be a member of the Sacramento MSBL. The founders and leadership of our league over the years have much to be proud of and our league is second to none.



Ernie "Doc" Hook

Ernie Hook grew up in Southern California, played Little League and Pony League in Rolling Hills Estates, California, from ages 7-14 years old. After his freshman year of baseball at Rolling Hills High School, he finished his last three years playing varsity baseball at Newport Harbor High School in Newport Beach, California. He preferred baseball rather than surfing.

He attended Cal Poly San Luis Obispo from 1974-1978 studying in the biological sciences department. He made the baseball team as a recruited left-handed pitcher. After the initial season, he opted to concentrate on the rigors of a biological science major and biochemistry minor as a premedical student.

He attended the California College of Podiatric Medicine in San Francisco from 1978 though 1982. After completing a podiatric surgical residency in Orange County, he lived in Tustin, CA for approximately 12 years. During medical school, he played on an independent fast pitch softball team, and while living in Tustin he played slow pitch softball.

Upon relocating to Folsom, CA in 1995, he met several players (Kenton Lee and Joe Gonzalez) at a pizza restaurant near Lembi Park. After a brief discussion, he was invited to play with the newly formed SMSBL Tigers managed by Fred Creal. Ernie played with the Tigers for approximately 10 years and during that time he played with the Boys of Summer on a Sunday team with Fred Creal. He then played with the 40+ Giants for two to three seasons, then a brief stint with a Rangers 40+ team for one season. Ernie then played for approximately 10 years with the 40+ Cardinals, most recently he has been playing with the A’s Legends 50+ team. Currently, Ernie has signed on with the 68+ Rangers.

Ernie’s SMSBL career includes several league championships with Hall of Famers Fred Creal’s Tigers, Boys of Summer, and Derek Bullock’s Cardinals, including a league Father Son title. He has played in Phoenix several times with the championship Majic team in the late 90’s, the Auburn Braves and the Capitol City Cardinals Father Son MSBL champions. He has played in multiple father-son tournaments in Phoenix and in Sacramento with his son Josh who started at 16 years old.

Hook has coached his sons Sean and Josh through all of their years in Folsom American Little League, multiple travel ball teams including taking his son Josh to play in Cooperstown, New York, as their travel ball Bandits 12-year-old team competed at the Field of Dreams.

Ernie Hook has enjoyed 13 years of being an active volunteer for improvement of the Folsom High School baseball field and training facilities.

SMSBL has permitted him and all of us to enjoy participating in our love of the game of baseball. Hook feels blessed to be honored with so many friendships, great fun, laughs and memories. Ernie appreciates the support of his wife, Robbie, and his children, Jamie, Sean and Josh, while he participated in SMSBL since 1995.

Mark's baseball journey began at 10 years old when he began playing in the Salsipuedes Little League at the Santa Cruz County Fairgrounds. He continued to play through his junior year in high school, but much to Mark's chagrin he was cut from the team during his senior year.

Mark enrolled in Hartnell Junior College the following year where he was recruited to play water polo. He also decided to try out for the baseball team and ultimately made the team as a pitcher. Mark remembers the grueling fall days when he had two water polo practices and a baseball practice. Mark's Hartnell baseball team would go on to win the Coast Conference championship and advanced to the Division II California State JC Championships his freshman year. The Panthers rolled through the Championships with a 3-0 record to win the title. One of Mark's favorite moments was during the championship game when his Panthers were building a significant lead. The College of the Siskiyous coach asked the catcher if their pitcher was throwing very hard. The catcher responded "I don't know, I haven't caught one in a while". In 2014, Mark's State Championship baseball team was inducted into the Hartnell College Athletics Hall of Fame.

Mark transferred to San Jose State University and served as a student-assistant coach for the baseball team for a season while working on his Kinesiology undergraduate degree. Mark also had stints as the women's tennis conditioning coach and women's water polo assistant coach while working on his Master's Degree in Sport Management at SJSU.

In 1997, Mark was hired by the Athletic Department at Sacramento State to serve as the NCAA Compliance Coordinator and then later as an academic advisor for the athletes at Sac State. It was while he was at an Athletic Department BBQ that he met SMSBL Hall of Famer, John Rice. After talking some baseball, John asked Mark if he'd be interested in playing baseball again? With encouragement from his then girlfriend, Kris (now his wonderful wife), he decided to start playing again in 2005. Mark has played on the Seals, A's, Riverdogs, 51's, Bears and Patriots. Mark would like to thank John, Joe Soto and Pat Kelly for the opportunity to start playing this great game again. Mark thanks all those involved with starting and running this wonderful league as it has brought so many great people and so much joy into his life.

Mark has been on two AZ World Series championship teams, one with the Seals in 2020 and most recently with the Sacramento Nationals in 2023. Mark has also been on multiple SMSBL championship teams with the Seals, A's and 51's.



Jim Milligan

Meet Jim Milligan (Milly), a laid-back beach lover hailing from the sunny shores of Pacific Palisades, just a stone's throw away from the bustling city of Los Angeles. With sand between his toes from a young age, Jim's summers were filled with the rhythm of the waves, whether he was bodysurfing, sailing, or spiking volleyballs.

But Jim's real passion ignited on the baseball diamond at the tender age of eight, when he first stepped up as a catcher in the local West Los Angeles Little League. Despite life's twists and turns, Jim's dedication to the game never faltered. From the beaches of Hermosa to the horse ranches of Fallbrook, and now the tranquil town of Chico, he's laced up his cleats and grabbed his catching gear, making the 180-mile trek to play ball at least three times a week for over two half decades.

And whether he's playing in Arizona with the Braves, Royals or Tribe, he's always ready to collaborate with teammates and create lasting memories.

For Jim, SMSBL isn't just about baseball—it's about connecting with others, sharing experiences, and embracing the joy of the game, one pitch at a time.





Mike Wright

Baseball, for Mike has been such a large part of his life. Growing up with his dad who played Professionally in the Saint Louis Cardinals organization minor league affiliates (1956/57) in Oklahoma and the Florida state league after signing out of high school, he was born into baseball automatically. As a kid, he played just about every day, year-round. There were great memories that came from this, like playing a game of catch with Dad and pick up games with friends but he wanted to be a kid as well. Riding and racing bikes, basketball, soccer, playing board games, kick the can, cartoons, all with friends. By the time he was starting High School he became more interested in other sports.

A game called football had crept into his life, that he loved playing. After broken legs in his Freshman and Junior years he never really got to play, just practice and a few games his junior year. After High School Mike went into the Air Force stationed at the Academy and played all sports except baseball. He and his Wife Carrie started their family in the service as well. Mike would play catch with the kids but encouraged them to find their own way with regards to sports.

Over 30 years ago Mike saw an add in the local paper for Baseball Tryouts. He called in and signed up for the tryout. That morning, he dusted off his softball bag and started to go to the tryouts but he decided not to go. A few days later he received a call from The Manager of a Team called the Riverdogs, asking him to come to a game and just watch, he'd buy a beer afterwards. He showed up and watched the game. While watching he had flash backs to those days with his father, playing catch, holding his hand, and walking into my first big league stadium. The green of the grass, the contrast to the infield dirt, smells, it was great and that existed at that field he was watching. He kept thinking I could hit what that pitcher was throwing; he could do that; he could pitch as well. After having that beer with the Manager after the game, Mike became a Riverdog, and have been ever since and the rest is history.

Playing baseball again is now fun, Mike considers The SMSBL a large part of his life now. "I know I can't hit and throw like I did in the past, but for me it's about the friendships, personal challenges, camaraderie, and all the great players and plays in our league".

"From a pitcher's standpoint its wins and losses, I got the win, I took the loss". Having played all sports over the years, baseball is truly more than all others a team game. It takes all the players on the field and in the line-up to collect a victory. Mike has played on a lot of other teams in the SMSBL and other leagues, but he is a Riverdog.

Mike also played on a team which featured 4 members of the Charleston, South Carolina Riverdogs (Tampa Bay Rays affiliate) and has MSBL World Series championships with the Las Vegas Rattlers 2007 and Sacramento Blue Jays 2018.

Since playing again, he's played with and against about everybody over 40 in the SMSBL and won more games than lost, and during that time established himself as a quality pitcher for the Riverdogs.

Mike's feelings about the game of baseball is it requires all 9 fielders to act as a team and the line-up to produce to score enough runs to collect the victory. Saying we've won a lot of games over the years to Mike sounds better that he's won a lot of games. The players in the SMSBL League are great and they show that in tournament play everywhere they go. It's a real honor to be admitted to be included on a short list of great players in our area. Mike hopes to be able to do this a little longer and meet a few more players and friends. "Thank you all so much for making this part of my life great again."
